We are pleased to present our indent offer on the 2023 wines from Domaine Louis Jadot. They are one of the most venerable, trusted and revered wine houses in Burgundy. Since the beginning, the labels were adorned by the instantly recognisable image of Bacchus's head, an image that has become in many ways, the signature of the house, and a symbol of its identity.

The Jadot family arrived in Beaune from Belgium in 1794 and became vigneron in the region. They purchased their first vineyard, the Clos des Ursules in 1826. However, it wasn't until 1859 that Louis Henry Denis Jadot founded Maison Louis Jadot. One of his key decisions to making the highest quality wines, was to build a significant vineyard base. This vision remains core to the business today.

After his death, his son, Louis Baptiste Jadot, expanded his export markets and clients in France. Baptiste's eldest son Louis Auguste Jadot inherited the firm in 1939 and further extended the export market to the United States, Great Britain, Holland, South America, and New Zealand. In 1954, André Gagey joined Maison Jadot as an assistant to Louis Auguste Jadot. In 1962 Louis died unexpectedly, and André was entrusted with the management by Madame Jadot, which he ran for the next three decades. A member of the Gagey family has headed the company ever since. Many of the top wines still come from their family's personal vineyard holdings.

Over the last 166 years Jadot has maintained the exceptional quality of its wines through the steady acquisition of the greatest vineyards in Burgundy, and now produce wines from over 150 appellations. They own almost 125ha of vineyards in the Côte d'Or and more than 298 vineyard parcels sites including 14 Grand Cru and 74 Premier Cru. These have been run organically for many years and are now fully certified.

In keeping with overseeing quality at all levels, Jadot also has its own in-house cooperage and barrel brand, Cadus, which was established in 1996. These are serious, structured wines, designed for long aging, and they belong in every proper wine lover's cellar.

2023 VINTAGE REPORT

"I adore the 2023 Vintage. It is not the greatest ever, but I am hard pushed to think of another vintage so pleasurable from barrel—pleasure that its best growers will translate into bottle. Time and again, as I tasted unfinished wines, thoughts of relishing the same finished wine at some future date kept popping into my head. The best wines can be summed up in a single word... Charm. Market prices aside, tasting these wines from barrel, I was reminded time and again that nothing matches a Meursault, Vosne-Romanée or Gevrey-Chambertin in full flight. There is something life-affirming when encountering great Chardonnay or Pinot Noir, whatever the vineyard or grower. These wines will give immense pleasure.

The whites lean towards a "sunnier" style of Chardonnay in that yellow fruit dominates. These are certainly not tensile or malic articulations of the variety. The whites are not as obviously tropical, like some 2018s and 2020s. More accurately, they lean into that style without veering too far away from traditional white Burgundy, thanks to the absence of summer heatwaves. Many maintain sufficient acidity levels and low pHs to counterbalance any richness delivered by that late summer climb in temperatures.

The reds are the real surprise. As long as you controlled your yields, nature gave you fruit that ingeniously combines the ripeness of say, 2020, with the freshness of say, 2017. You could argue that the 2023s share some consanguinity with the 2017s—vintage that I have appreciated more as time passes—yet I wager the 2023s are better than that. What is intriguing about the vintage is that either by design or default, the season compels producers whose wines gravitate towards blacker, more concentrated, perhaps more opulent styles, to one that leans much more into red fruit and finesse. The fruit profile in the Pinot Noirs pivots from black to red, which is where the variety reaches its zenith. The reds convey a sense of transparency, more weightless than weighty. Acidity levels are not necessarily high, yet there is abundant freshness. Textures can often be a little crunchy, and this frequently tends to amplify frisson. These Pinots are going to be very tempting in their youth. Perhaps they will replace 2021s that are proving so delicious in infancy. As much as I will not begrudge those who wish to drink the 2023s in their youth, they also have the balance and energy to reward the dwindling numbers who uphold the lost art of cellaring.

Domaine J.A. Ferret



DOMAINE J.A. FERRET

Domaine J.A. Ferret is a jewel in the heart of the most famous “climats” of the Fuissé amphitheatre with a history dating back to 1840. They were one of the first properties in Pouilly-Fuissé to bottle its own wines, starting more than 60 years ago. A precise knowledge of the region’s most remarkable terroirs forms the basis of the parcel by parcel vinification for which the Domaine is renowned: in particular, the classification of Tête de Cru and Hors Classe were established by Jeanne Ferret. It was entirely down to her that the wines were bottled at the Domaine. Louis Jadot acquired this prestigious 18 hectare property in 2008 with the aim of continuing the tradition of excellence established by the highly regarded Ferret family. Thanks to a pristine gravity flow winery and a complex patchwork of vineyard sites, Domaine Ferret is recognised for producing some of the very finest Pouilly Fuissé, very much the equal of the Côte de Beaune. All of the wines are made in a sustainable way following organic practices.



2023 Ferret Pouilly-Fuisse - \$90

The Pouilly-Fuissé is a blend of only the best vineyard parcels with 35-year-old vines from the Fuissé amphitheater and soils composed of limestone and clay. Each parcel was vinified separately to ensure the finest expression of the fruit. Half the wine was fermented in enameled tanks and half in two to four-year-old oak barrels. The wine was aged for ten months on lees in French oak barrels, not new, from Tronçais, Vosges and Nevers stave wood.

"This delightful wine boasts a good concentration of ripe pear and lime peel on the nose with hints of butter, spice, and some smoky reductive notes. There is a pleasant concentration on the palate, with balanced acidity that leads the wine to an elegant, lingering finish. This flagship cuvée is an assemblage of many parcels (including some declassified premier crus) that total over 9.5 hectares. The grapes are gently pressed before fermentation in tank and ageing in used casks. This wine is a beautiful entry point to a powerful range. Drink 2023-2033"

2023 Ferret Pouilly Fuisse Clos des Prouges 'Tete de Cru' - \$130

Situated right in the centre of the village of Fuissé, this special Clos is just over two "hectares" in size and is planted on a shallow slope that faces east. It was excluded for Premier Cru status in the recent classification due to a lack of historical significance, but Ferret believes it is one of their finest parcels. Most of the vineyard dates back to 1956, and is therefore more than 65 years old, making it one of the oldest owned by the Domaine. Fermentation and maturation took place in barrel, of which 25% were new and 75% were 2nd, 3rd and 4th use. Maturation lasted 10 months, then the wine spent a further 9 months in stainless steel tanks on fine lees.

"This clos in the village of Fuissé has produced a wine of marvellous concentration in 2022, with aromas of passionfruit and pomelo and hints of hazelnut and spice. The texture is dense but not heavy; some well-integrated oak aromas carry through on the palate. The oldest vines are over 70 years of age, planted in marly soil on a gentle, east-facing slope in the heart of Fuissé. A two-hectare parcel purchased by Jadot after they bought Ferret; it was excluded from premier cru status but tastes equivalent in quality to me. Drink 2025-2035"

WHITE BURGUNDIES

"Winemaker Frédéric Barnier and his team have once again delivered a strong portfolio chez Jadot. Barnier stressed the importance of sorting and of vigilance during élevage, and he didn't hesitate to perform a saignée for cuvées where yields were high. As I've written before, in the cellar, foudres and 500-liter barrels now complement classic 228-liter pièces, a further evolution adapting to warmer, riper vintages. What's more, barrels are now used four rather than three times, meaning the percentage of new oak overall has fallen. A cold room also helps chill down any fruit that's too warm when it enters the winery, something especially important during the warm 2023 harvest. This vintage also marks the third vintage of organic conversion for the Domaine Louis Jadot and the Domaine Gagey.

2023 Jadot Chablis - \$54.99

Although Maison Louis Jadot is not the first major Burgundy producer to venture slightly north into Chablis, the historic house has taken a distinctly different approach from others. Under the guidance of director Frédéric Barnier, they first took time to understand Chablis, making a small amount of wine there starting in 2015. Since then, Barnier has been picking the right growers in the best and most prestigious spots, and to underscore its commitment to the region, Louis Jadot built a winery in Chablis that was finished for the 2019 vintage. Having a winery right in Chablis means that grapes can go directly from vineyard to the sorting table without being trucked south for almost two hours in harvest-season traffic; this allows him better precision and more flexibility in his window of picking. While the standard Burgundy barrel is 228 liters, Barnier uses 450-liter barrels and much larger foudres, which impart a minimal touch of oak because there is less surface contact between the wine and the wood.

"Mineral and precise with aromas of Meyer lemons, flint, apple blossoms and nectarines. The midweight palate has a tightly wound mouthfeel and bright acidity, offering lovely length and tension with a slightly saline finish. Good energy. Drink or hold."

2023 Jadot Beaune Bressandes Blanc 1er Cru - \$135

"The 2023 Beaune 1er Cru Bressandes Blanc (Domaine Gagey) is especially good this year, wafting from the glass with notes of pear, green apple, toasted almonds and white flowers. Medium to full-bodied, satiny and layered, it's concentrated and vibrant, with a penetrating finish."

2023 Jadot 'Duc de Magenta' Puligny Montrachet Clos de la Garenne 1er Cru - \$295

"Pale lemon colour. A little touch of coconut. Discretion up front, more weight of fruit behind, still the coconut and then a very engaging length behind. Quite a complete expression, enlivened by a racy finish. Drink from 2030-2038."

"High-toned and firm with resounding minerality, this has more savory notes than most Puligny bottlings, with most of their expected, floured finesse. Still, there are ample, charismatic apple fruits as well as the resounding minerality typical of Puligny. A smaller harvest than usual here, be on the lookout for these bottles."

2023 Jadot 'Domaine des Héritiers Jadot' Corton Charlemagne Grand Cru- \$610

"This concentrated, focused chardonnay is still tightly wound, but the stony minerality builds impressively, and the citrusy vitality gives it an impression of lightness in spite of the abundant power. Be patient until all of this can fully resolve, because the mineral drive in the finish promises great things to come. Drinkable now but best from 2027."

"The grapes are from the domaine-owned plot in the south-facing Les Pougets, next to Le Charlemagne in Aloxe. Mid lemon yellow. Strict, fine and expressing the stony character of the vineyard more than the exuberance of the vintage. This is actually perfectly balanced, with just the right ripeness on the palate too. A fine minerality. Poise, class and length, very good. Drink from 2030-2038."

"The 2023 Corton-Charlemagne Grand Cru (Domaine des Héritiers Jadot) is another terrific rendition of this bottling, which might well be the most underrated of the house's grand cru whites. Unwinding in the glass with aromas of citrus oil, confit lemon, petrol, vanilla pod and toasty reduction, it's full-bodied, satiny and rich, with a layered, dense mid-palate and a long, mineral finish."

2023 Jadot Savigny les Beaune La Dominode 1er Cru - \$95

"The Dominode bottling from Jadot is consistently its top wine from this village. The 2023 boasts a deep ruby hue and pronounced aromas of black plum and mulberry, with an edge of mineral concentration and a hint of spice. The texture is tannic and dense, driving the wine to an impressively lingering finish that displays a great purity of fruit due to the ageing in large oak uprights (foudres). The grapes are from 1.75ha of east-facing vines that are up to 80 years of age." Drink 2027-2045

"The 2023 Savigny-lès-Beaune 1er Cru La Dominode (Domaine Louis Jadot) is showing especially well, offering up a deep bouquet of sweet berries, spices and licorice, followed by a medium to full-bodied, ample and fleshy palate that's impressively textural and concentrated."

"The 2023 Savigny-lès-Beaune La Dominode 1er Cru has more lift and perfume compared to the Clos des Guettes, with finely delineated red cherries, strawberries and rooibos. The palate is balanced and structured with a bit of sinew on the opening, a powdery texture and conspicuous bell pepper notes toward the finish. Drink over four to six years." Drink 2026-2034

2023 Jadot Beaune Aux Cras 1er Cru - \$120

"What a stunning example of the vintage in Beaune. This really shows what makes these wines stand out. Deep sour-cherry and summer-flower aromas and a wonderfully creamy texture on the mouth-filling, medium-bodied palate. I love what the very fine tannins do for this wine, right through the long seductive finish. Drink or hold."



"The Jadot version of Beaune Cras from the Gagey family vineyard in 2023 offers impressive ripeness to the plum and blackberry fruit. The structure seems more powerful and relatively tannic, with less of the moreish, approachable side that was so attractive last year. Frédéric Barnier notes that this is a fairly early-ripening parcel since it is exposed to the southeast. With three to five years in bottle this should be delicious." Drink 2025-2045

"A classic of the domaine, just like Rugiens or Ursules. Perfumed and elegant, just like you expect a Volnay to be, this is quite generous but also silky and delicate. Builds very nicely on the polished, medium-bodied palate. Beneath all of this is a very solid base of fine tannins. Drink or hold"

"The 2023 Volnay Clos de la Barre 1er Cru has more nuance and refinement on the nose compared to the Volnay Santenot: it is well focused with mineral-driven red berry fruit. The palate is medium-bodied with finely chiseled tannins, poised though not powerful per se, with a finish that just seems to "glide." This is a quite delicious Volnay in prospect and probably the best of the trio." Drink 2026-2040

"The 2023 Volnay 1er Cru Clos de la Barre Monopole (Maison Louis Jadot) has turned out nicely, delivering notes of raspberries, orange zest and spices, followed by a medium-bodied, ample and fleshy palate animated by succulent acids, segueing into a saline finish."

2023 Jadot ‘Domaine des Héritiers Jadot’ Beaune Clos des Ursules 1er Cru - \$185

“There’s a lovely depth of fruit here with lifted, perfumed aromas of cherries, rose petals, blood oranges, hibiscus and terra-cotta. The medium-bodied palate has a silky, rounded mouthfeel, supported by fine-grained tannins. A great balance between freshness and power, offering immediate drinking pleasure and good aging potential.”

“An enclave in Vignes Franches that’s one of the house’s emblematic wines, always performs well. The 2023 Beaune 1er Cru Clos des Ursules (Domaine des Héritiers Jadot) puts in a strong performance again this year. An even ruby purple. This is very complete, the fruit covering the palate effortlessly, the acid and tannin structure perfectly balanced and a particularly long aftertaste with a suggestion of blood orange. Drink from 2030-2038.”

2023 Jadot Pommard Les Grands Epenots 1er Cru - \$195

The commune of Pommard produces only red wines, and has no Grands Crus. Grands Epenots would certainly be considered in any reclassification. It is one of two parcels under the name Les Epenots, situated in the north of the commune on 62 acres of clay and calcareous soil. The word Epenots comes from the French épines, referring to the spiny bushes that once surrounded the vineyard.

“Since its replanting with high-quality Pinot Noir selections, this cuvée is fast establishing itself as a highlight of the range, and the 2023 Pommard 1er Cru is a worthy follow-up to the 2022. Mingling aromas of raspberries and cherries with rose petals, spices, orange zest and licorice, it’s medium to full-bodied, velvety and suave, with a polished, perfumed profile and a penetrating finish.”

2023 Jadot 'Domaine des Héritiers Jadot' Corton Pougets Grand Cru - \$270

"Taken from a foudre rather than cask, the 2023 Corton-Pougets Grand Cru has an enticing bouquet with wonderfully defined red berry fruit, hints of tobacco and forest floor, delivering the complexity you'd expect from arguably Jadot's strongest red cuvée in the Côte de Beaune. The palate is medium-bodied with fine tannins. Displaying exquisite balance and poise with plenty of nascent energy and a sustained, lightly spiced finish, this 2023 is up to the task of following the impressive 2022. Superb." Drink 2030-2060

"A full ruby to crimson. The bouquet makes a statement, more savoury than sucrosity. The Corton Pougets has fine depth too, with tannins, but all this will come together. The finish is drawn out and chalky. Jadot is the last producer of Corton Pougets GC.

2023 Jadot Chambolle-Musigny Les Fuees 1er Cru - \$285

"An excellent balance of finesse and depth, showing aromas of dried strawberries, fresh flowers, blueberry bush, wet bark, blood oranges and citrus peel. The silken, textural palate has an elusive yet rounded mouthfeel, fine-grained tannins and a bright acidity that finishes polished. From a great premier cru that exudes class. Drink or hold"

"The 2023 Chambolle-Musigny Les Fuées 1er Cru possesses much more intensity than the Les Baudes, with more vibrant red fruit and mineralité underscored by light autumn bonfire scents. The palate is medium-bodied and well balanced with fine tannins. This is not a powerful or voluptuous Chambolle yet I appreciate the deft spiciness on the finish. Drink over the next ten to twelve years." Drink 2026-2042

2023 Jadot Gevrey-Chambertin Clos St Jacques 1er Cru - \$475

"The tension between dark fruit and profound earthy minerality is what makes this pinot noir a masterpiece. Excellent, ripe sour-cherry aroma and stunning vitality on the medium- to full-bodied palate. Great drive in the very long, beautifully balanced finish. Drinkable now but best from 2026."

"Jadot has stepped up a gear in terms of its Clos Saint-Jacques in recent vintages and this will give the likes of Rousseau and Clair a run for their money. The 2023 Gevrey-Chambertin Clos Saint-Jacques 1er Cru, which was shown as a blend of foudre and barrel, really shows its class (as usual). It is blessed with much more delineation and mineralité than the Estournelles or Lavaux, soaring in the glass with vivacious red fruit and just a subtle flintiness in the background. The palate is medium-bodied with fine tannins. It does not quite possess the ambition of the 2022 and is perhaps a little stricter, but I adore the hoisin-tinged finish and sustained peppery aftertaste. There is class here, and this should age easily for 20 to 25 years." Drink 2027-2050

"These 50 year old vines sit in the center of the Clos. The darkest colour of the three wines from the St-Jacques sector; and the most sombre in fruit. But there is a great deal of it, and it fills the mouth comprehensively. Very backward, quite firm tannins, and while I could use a bit more liveliness I expect that will come later. Drink from 2030-2040."

2023 Jadot Chapelle-Chambertin Grand Cru - \$650

"A fine even ruby. The bouquet is pure class from the very outset. Excellent tension on the palate as the fine raspberry fruit maintains a freshness of acidity. 67% of the vines are still from the original centenary planting. Magical balance, length and consistency of fruit. Drink from 2033-2045."

"One of the comparative sleepers of the range is the 2023 Chapelle-Chambertin Grand Cru (Domaine Louis Jadot), from vines planted in the 1920s that used to belong to Domaine Clair Daü. Offering up aromas of raspberries, rose petals, bergamot and licorice, it's medium to full-bodied, layered and suave, with a perfumed core of fruit, succulent acids and a long, saline finish. This old-vine cuvée is once again a highlight chez Jadot."

"Note: from En Gémeaux; these are the oldest vines in the Jadot portfolio of owned vineyards. A perfumed, airy and beautifully layered nose freely reveals aromas of plum, spice, red and dark currant and more moderate oak influence. The gorgeously textured medium weight flavors possess even better size and weight while delivering fine length on the impressively persistent finish that also displays a touch of bitter pit fruit character. Excellent potential!"
